Phillip Burnes
of Mercer Co. in the State of Kentucky
who was a private in the company commanded
by Captain Neal of the regiment commanded
by General Donnell in the North Carolina
line for 16 months

Enrolled on the Roll of Kentucky
at the rate of 33 Dollars 33 Cents per annum
to commence on the 4th day of March, 1831.

Certificate of Pension issued the 15th day of July
1853 and sent to
J. Maugh Harrodsburg

Revolutionary Claim, Va.
Act June 7, 1832

On this 3rd day of June A.D. 1853 personally appeared
in open Court & Court, before the undersigned Justice
of the Mercer County Court now sitting Philip Boone
Sr. a resident of this County of Washington, aged twenty
four years, who being first duly sworn according to
Law doth on his Oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress
passed the 7th day of June 1832.

That he was drafted in Lincoln County in the
State of North Carolina for a tour of three months in
the Army of the Revolution, and marched under Captain
George Smith and joined a detachment of General Gwyn
Army near Mocklinburg, where we were stationed for
some time from thence we were ordered to Salisbury
to guard some British prisoners that had been taken
by the American Army, at which place we built a
stockade and my tour of service having expired, I was
honorably discharged by my Captain, he thinks it was
in the year 1780. but the day or month he cannot re-
collect. he returned home, and some time after he thinks
in the ~~fall~~ ^{fall} of 1781, he entered Captain Mordick Blakes
Company of Militia as a substitute for one George
Doy for a tour of three months and marched to South
Carolina and joined General Gwyns Army on the
Santee Hills, from which place we marched and cross-
ed the river until ^{his} tour of 3 months expired when
He was discharged but he cannot recollect the place
nor the day of the month, it was at some place in
South Carolina but the name he cant recollect. He
returned home and in the year 1781. His Father was
drafted to go agst the Indians, and he took his
place and marched to the head of the Catawba River
and was stationed at Fort Charles under Colonel

Joseph M. Donnell ^{His} Captain's name was William
Neal, He was discharged at said Fort after serving
fully three months; this he thinks was in the Spring
of 1786. He returned home and orders came for more
men he thinks on or about the 14th, they came and fell
to him to go and the understanding was the ballance
should throw in something to him who had to serve
the Tour; and they did pay up very liberally he
marched under Captain Brawner and joined the
army in South Carolina this was after the Battle
of the Eutaw Springs; and near which place he
joined the main army. This was a tour of eighteen
months but he served only seven or eight months before
the war closed and the whole of the North Carolina
(Troops were discharged), He rec^d Regular discharges
but they have long since been Mustered or lost, he does
solemnly declare that he cannot recollect the dates, nor
all the country through which they marched, but that
he did serve faithfully the Tours set forth in his
declarations, he hereby relinquishes every claim what
ever to a pension or annuity except the present
and declares that his name is not on the pension
roll of the agency of any state, ~~territory~~ and nation
and that the reason of his making his declarations before
the Mercer County Court is because his principle witness
George Gabbart living in Mercer County, Sworn to and
subscribed this day and year aforesaid,

The deposition of George Gabbart taken in behalf
of Philip Burtis sen^r. the deponent being seventy
three years of age and duly sworn according to Law
doth on his oath make the following declaration, that
he lived in the County of Burke & State of North Carolina
and adjoining the County of Lincoln, that he was well

Know all men by these Presents, That *J. Philip Burns*,
 son of *Philip Burns Dec. a Revolutionary Pensioner,*
 who died January 28th 1849 and whose widow died
 sometime in June 1851. - day of the month not numbered.

For one piece of paper 1851

in the Army of the Revolution, do hereby constitute and appoint *J. H. Moncarat* who was a Soldier
 true and lawful Attorney
 for *me* and in *my* name to prosecute against the Government of the United States, before
 any Department thereof, any and all claim or claims *I may* have to arrears of pay or Pension
 money, under any Act or Acts, Resolution or Resolutions, of the Congress of the United States, and
 especially the Acts 4th July, 1836, 7th July, 1838, 3d March, 1843, 17th June, 1844, 2d February,
 1848 and 29th July, 1848—as well as the more ancient Acts of 18th March, 1818, 15th May, 1828,
 and 7th June, 1832.

Said Attorney *is* moreover authorised in *my* name to demand at any Department
 of the said Government, a re-consideration of any decision hitherto or hereafter to be given, touching
my interests, and to obtain from any Department or the archives thereof, any and all
 information or evidence of whatever character relating to or in anywise bearing upon the claim or
 claims we hereby seek the investigation of.

- Said Attorney *is* moreover authorised to do any and all things necessary to carry out
 the foregoing purposes, and to receive the Certificates of Pension or other character of drafts or
 evidences of the amounts due *me* and to appoint one or more Sub-Attorneys, and to confer
 upon him or them all the powers herein conferred upon *the said J. H. Moncarat* hereby ratifying
 and confirming all that *my* said Attorney may do by virtue of these presents.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter of December 1, 1936, in which you state that you desire to prove that Philip Burns, son of Philip Burns, Sr., Revolutionary War pensioner, S. 30909, was your ancestor, and desire to know if in said claim for pension reference was made to other children of Philip Burns, Sr., to any children of Philip, Jr., or to his wife, whether Philip, Junior's signature is shown or whether some one signed for him and who, full information in regard to relationship of Philip, Sr. and Philip, Jr., why was Philip, Jr. corresponding with the government in 1853 and who gave dates of death of Philip, Sr. and his wife.

In the claim for pension, S. 30909, no other children of Philip Burns, Sr. were referred to than Philip. No children of Philip Burns, Jr., or his wife, were referred to.

In 1853, Philip Burns submitted a power of attorney, which instrument was executed in Mercer County, Kentucky, in 1853, in order to obtain any pension which might have been due on account of the service of his father, Philip Burns, Sr., in the Revolutionary War. His signature was by mark and witnessed by E. D. Veatch, Justice of the Peace of Mercer County, Kentucky, and by S. H. Stevenson. In this power of attorney, Philip Burns, Jr., whose age is not given, stated that his father died January 28, 1849, and whose widow died sometime in June, 1851. He did not give her name or age or date and place of marriage to his father. There are no further family data, whatever, in this claim for pension.

The records of this office do not show date when pension ceased.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name and address of person paid in this case, you should apply to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division,

this city, and cite the following data: Phillip Burnes, Certificate
18938, issued July 15, 1938, rate, \$83.33 per annum, commenced
March 4, 1931, Act June 7, 1938, Kentucky Agency.
