A few words concerning Clara Holloway Hill.

Clara Holloway was a sister to John, and George from England. Whiter thinks she married Samuel Hill in Eng. and migrated to America several years after her brothers died, and settled in Va. and died there. They were wealthy in land, and slaves, with all needful surroundings. Samuel Hill was a genuine Englishman with a large strong frame, and a persevering, overbearing temper, and an ungovernable temper, which his family much trouble. He was very peculiar in his manner of treatment toward his servants, and family: he was heard to say to his men; "Well while we are resting we will go and roll logs; the horses were resting. He was clearing the ground for plowing, and rolling logs to be burned. After the death of the old folks, the remainder of the family went to Ky. to where the Holloways settled, in 1811.

She was writing 100+ years after the death of Samuel Hill. She married into the family and moved to Mo. within 2 or 3 yrs of the time Henry Hill left on the Oregon trail of Clarence Holloway Hill. had lived with Henry ca. 1840 in Mo., that was about 8 yrs before Zenobia came there. But Henry son, Joseph Littlewood Hill, Zenobia's husband, ran a blacksmith shop together in

6th They were parents of several children George, Henry, and a sister Nancy, who married Samuel Pickett, there were others whose names are forgotten.

Henry Hill a son of Samuel, and Clara Hill married his cousin Elizabeth, daughter of John Holloway from Eng. The children of Henry, and Elizabeth Hill were Martha, Clemencia, and Joseph. —

Martha, daughter of Henry, and Elizabeth married Stephen Hill: they had the same name but not related. —

Clemencia died in Cal., and was single. —

Joseph married Bettie Hill, a niece of Stephen Hill; not related, to each other. People should scatter, and not many of the same family live near each other. The Holloways liked their kin too much, and so many married their cousins.
