ITEM I.

I request and direct that all my just debts, including my funeral expenses, be paid from my estate by my executrix as soon after my death as is practicable.

ITEM II.

After the payment of my debts, I devise and bequeath all the rest and residue of my estate, both realty and personalty, of whatever kind, nature, character, or description, and wheresoever the same may be located at the time of my death, to my wife, MARCELLA H. ROBERTSON, absolutely and with fee simple title.

ITEM III.

I nominate and constitute my wife, MARCELLA H. ROBERTSON, as executrix of this, my LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT, and request that she be so appointed by the Court and that no bond be required of her in such capacity.

 1. I direct that all of my just debts and funeral expenses
be first paid out of my estate.
 2. I give and bequeath to my daughter, Lannie Williams,
the set of hand painted china which she gave to me.
 3. I give and bequeath to my daughter Jewell Herring, the
set of Silver tea spoons which she gave to me.
 4. My son, Gilbert Robertson, during the life time of my
husband, L. M. Robertson, received considerably more than his proportion of
the estate, and for that reason I do not give him anything by this will.

In the name of God, Amen. I, Louis N. Robertson, farmer of Owensboro, Daviess County, Kentucky, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make this my last will and testament, revoking all wills by me at any time heretofore made.

1. I direct that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid.
2. I will, devise and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Ida B. Robertson, all of my property, real, personal and mixed, to have and to hold unto her absolutely and in fee simple with full power of disposition, except as modified by clause No. 3 of this will, and except that my said wife is hereby directed to appropriate \$1,000.00 of the money derived from my insurance to church or charity, the object of said bounty to be selected by her.
3. I bequeath to my two daughters, Lannie Robertson, and Jewel Robertson, the sum of \$175.00 each, to be paid to them out of my estate by my executrix hereinafter named, at the time of their going away from home to do for themselves. This bequest is in lieu of a horse and cow, which I have given to each one of my other children when they left home.
4. If at the time of the death of my said wife, Ida B. Robertson she has not disposed of all of the property which she takes under this will and she does not dispose of same by will, then that part of my estate which shall remain undisposed of shall be equally divided among my seven children, share and share alike, except that any debts which any one of said children shall owe to me or to my estate shall be deducted from that child's distributable share. If any one of my said children should die before a distribution is made to them under the terms of this will, leaving children of their own, then said children, my grandchildren, shall take the distributable share of their parent.
5. I hereby nominate and appoint my said wife, Ida B. Robertson, the executrix of this my will and I direct that she be permitted to qualify without the execution of any bond.

Should either of my sons decline to act as executor, then the other shall administer my estate fully as a single executor.
