January 12 1848

Mr Moses Springfield dear comrade as I have those papers sent me
by my attorney I will send them to you hoping you will do the very
best you can for me I will try and jog your memory as well as I can
as now I wave down a long time at Onsbrough with fever and
no sleep and after we went to Henderson I wave still slower and
had the yellow jaundice and wave not able for duty for a bout
love months then I got some better and you remember what a hard time
we had at the end of 63 you now what a cold spell we had there

January and the boys wave all down as with measles and I had to
go on duty every day all through that spell then I ~~went~~
again ~~to~~ contracted cold that wave hands on me

and settled on my lungs but I still got better until we went
on that injurious Rail then I contracted a rather cold that
has lasted me till now I dont know how your memory is now but
I hope that you remember while we wave at Louis will by I wave sore
horse that I could not speak a bare a whisper and a smothering
and pain in my left breast I will send you what my attorney wrote
to me and you can see just what she wants we have a
affidavit filed out just a cording to my Application
if you can not swear to it I send you a blank one you can
fill it out your self you will please go before a N. Rand swear
to it and return to Gaspier Partridge, Carver White Co Ills
and what ever charges they are on it I will send it to you

Orderly I hope you cant make this out I am so nervous to
day I hope you will attend to this as early as you can
and a bly a friend I will expect a letter from you
soon yours

You will please look over the affidavit that is made out and it
will help to jog your memory I hope you will be able to swear
to the wave that is made out I have six affidavits just like it
and two of them from good Physicians one from John M
Williams one from Taylor Gunnitt from Comperny R.

If my health wave so as I could stand the trip I would come
and fetch those papers and then we could talk over old
wave times
