# Cosby

"These were honored in their generations, and were the glory of their time."—Ecclesiasticus xliv, 7.

"It is indeed a desirable thing to be well descended, but the glory belongs to our ancestors."—Plutarch.

The Cosby family is of Saxon origin and trace their lineage back to the Saxon Kings of England, Pepin le Gros, Charlemagne, Rollo the Dane and William the Conqueror, the Kings of France, the Kings of Spain, and through the ancient Irish and Scottish Kings to Baoth, the great-grandson of Noah and on to Adam. (See Genesis, Chapters V, X, and XI; O'Hart's Irish Pedigrees; Genealogical Chart of the Royal Houses of Europe, by Frederick L. Hartland; "Genealogies of the Sovereigns of the World", by William Betham; "Royal Descent of the Seymours", published in the Journal of American History, Vol. V, page 585; Burke's Peerage, 1904, page 1439, and Burke's Landed Gentry, Volume I, page 266. They are also descended from twelve of the Sureties of the Magna Charta, wrested from King John of England (1199-1216) on the field of Runnemede-namely, William d'Albini, Roger Bigod, Hugh Bigod, Richard de Clare, Gilbert de Clare, John de Lacie, William de Lanvellei, William de Malet, Saher de Quincey, Robert de Ros, Geoffrey de Say, and Robert de Vere. The family possessed the lordship of Cossibey, County Leicester, England, previous to the Norman Conquest (1066). It became settled in Ireland during the reign of Queen Mary (1553-1558).

The coat-of-arms of the family is as follows:

Arms: Quarterly first arg., a chevron between three leopards, faces sable, on a canton of the first or, a saltier vert between a cross crosslet in chief gu., a lizard erect in the dexter and a lucy haurient in the sinister fesse point of the fourth, and a dexter hand couped at the wrist in base gu.

Crest: A griffin, his wings erect, gu., supporting a standard or, the head broken off, arg.

Motto: Audaces fortuna juvat—"Fortune aids the bold", or "Daring renews fortune".

Starting with Edward I, King of England in 1272 (No. 118 in Line of Descent from William the Conqueror to Edward I, King of England, see Addenda, page 415), the line runs as follows:

118 EDWARD I, "Longshanks", born June 17, 1239, and died July 7, 1307; crowned King of England in 1272; married in 1254 Princess Eleanor, daughter of Ferdinand III, King of Castile and Leon (see No. 21 in Line of Descent from the Spanish Kings, Addenda, page 422).

- 119 JOAN DE ACRE, Plantagenet, so called because she was born at Acre, in Palestine, during the Third Crusade in 1273. She married Gilbert de Clare, the Red Earl, born September 2, 1243, 9th Earl of Clare, 7th Earl of Hertford, 5th Earl of Gloucester (see No. 16 in De Clare Lineage, Addenda, page 428). She afterwards married Ralf de Morthermer.
- 120 ELEANOR DE CLARE married Hugh le Despencer (who became Earl of Gloucester in right of his wife), son of Hugh le Despencer, Earl of Winchester. Both he and his father were beheaded in 1326. She afterwards married William La Zouche. Children of the first marriage were Hugh, Edward, Gilbert, Philip, Elizabeth, and Isabel le Despencer who married Richard Fitz-Alan, 9th Earl of Arundel (see No. 11 in line of descent from Richard Bigod and his son, Hugh Bigod, both Sureties for the Magna Charta, and No. 9 in line of descent from Robert de Vere. also a Surety for the Magna Charta, pages 425 and 434 of Addenda).
- 121 PHILIP LE DESPENCER, mentioned above, whose son was
- 122 PHILIP LE DESPENCER, father of
- 123 PHILIP LE DESPENCER, who had a son
- 124 SIR PHILIP LE DESPENCER, Kt., of Nettlested, Suffolk and Lincolnshire.
- 125 MARGARET LE DESPENCER, married secondly Roger Wentworth (died 1452), and brought Nettlested to the Wentworths. Her first husband was John, Lord de Ros.
- 126 SIR PHILIP WENTWORTH, of Nettlested, Suffolk; married Mary de Clifford, daughter of John, Lord de Clifford, 10th Baron (see No. 128 in alternate line of descent from Edward I, King of England, page 293).
- 127 SIR HENRY WENTWORTH, 11th Baron; married Anne de Say, daughter of Sir John de Say. He died in 1499.
- 128 MARGARET WENTWORTH, married Sir John de Seymour, of Wolf Hall, in Wiltshire. (See page 295.) He was knighted in 1479 and died December 21, 1536. They left eight children, among them Jane Seymour, third wife of Henry VIII and mother of King Edward VI; Sir Thomas Seymour, Lord Admiral, and
- 129 SIR EDWARD SEYMOUR, born about 1506. He was created Duke of Somerset by his nephew, King Edward VI, in 1547. He married first Catherine Filliol, daughter of Sir William Filliol, and married secondly Anne Stanhope. He became Lord Protector of England but fell into disfavor and was beheaded in 1552. His daughter,
- 130 MARY SEYMOUR, married first Andrew Rogers; secondly Sir Henry Peyton, and thirdly Francis Cosby (see No. 5 in Cosby Lineage, page 296).
  - Another line of descent from Edward I, King of England (No. 118 ante), is as follows:
- 119 EDWARD II, King of England (1307-1327); married Isabel, daughter of Philip IV, King of France.
- 120 EDWARD III, King of England (1327-1377), founder of the Order of the Garter; married Philippa, the daughter of William, Count of Holland (known as Philippa of Hainault). Their third son,

- 121 LIONEL, Duke of Clarence, born in 1338, married Elizabeth de Burgh, daughter of William de Burgh, Earl of Ulster.
- 122 PHILIPPA, their daughter, born in 1355, married Edmund Mortimer, 3d Earl of March.
- 123 ELIZABETH MORTIMER, born in 1371; married Henry, Lord Percy, the famous "Hotspur", killed in battle in 1403, son of Henry Percy, 1st Earl of Northumberland, ninth in descent from Agnes de Percy and Josceline, of Louvain, son of Godfrey Barbatus who descended from Charlemagne (see Burke's Extinct Peerage, page 423). The ancestor of the Percys was William Algernoune de Percy who came to England from Normandy with William the Conqueror. The male descendants became extinct upon the death of the third Baron, William de Percy, and his daughter, Agnes de Percy, married Josceline upon condition that he assume the name of Percy. William de Percy was the son of Alan de Percy who married Emma, daughter of Gilbert de Gaunt, son of Baldwin VI, Count of Flanders and Artois, and a nephew of Mathildis, queen consort of William I, the Conqueror, King of England. William de Percy married Alice, daughter of Richard Fitz-Gilbert de Clare (see No. 11 in De Clare Lineage, Addenda, page 426). Their youngest son, Richard de Percy, was one of the Sureties for the Magna Charta and died without an heir.

Henry de Percy, the ninth feudal lord, gave much aid to Edward I. He obtained by purchase the barony of Alnwick, the chief seat of the family ever since. A daughter, Dorothy Percy, married in 1315 Robert Sydney, 2d Earl of Leicester. His son, Henry de Percy, defeated and captured David II, King of Scotland, at the battle of Neville's Cross in 1346. His grandson, Henry de Percy, married Mary Plantagenet, great-granddaughter of Henry III, King of England. His great-grandson, the fourth Lord Percy of Alnwick, was marshal at the coronation of Richard II and was created the same day Earl of Northumberland and it was his son, Sir Henry Percy, "Hotspur", who was slain at Shrewsbury in 1403, who married Elizabeth Mortimer, mentioned above. Their daughter,

- 124 ELIZABETH PERCY, married John, Lord de Clifford, 7th Baron, and died in 1432.
- 125 THOMAS DE CLIFFORD, 8th Baron, married Joan, daughter of Thomas de Dacre, 1st Baron, and was killed in 1454.
- 126 JOHN DE CLIFFORD, 9th Baron.
- 127 JOHN DE CLIFFORD, 10th Baron, married Margaret, daughter of Sir Henry de Bromflete, and died in 1485. (See No. 10 in De Say Lineage, Addenda, page 433.)
- 128 MARY DE CLIFFORD, married Sir Philip Wentworth (see No. 126 in alternate line of descent from Edward I, page 292).

# DERIVATION OF THE SURNAME SEYMOUR

The following account as to the derivation of the surname Seymour and the genealogical and historical record of the family has been culled from Volume I, pages 65-78, of English Peerage, by Frederic Barlow:

The family name, Seymour, was taken from the original settlement or place of residence in Normandy, Seymour being a corruption of St. Maur. The first bearing the name in England was Rogerus de Sancto Maur. The next, said to be directly descended, was Milo de St. Maur, who had two sons, Geoffrey and William, and who, in the 18th year of the reign of King John, joined the rebellious barons. Geoffrey settled in Somersetshire, and married the daughter and heiress of William de Reighdon.

Laurence de St. Maur, next mentioned, died in the 24th year of the reign of Edward I, leaving Nicholas de St. Maur who married Helen, eldest daughter of Alan La Zouche, of Ashby, in the county of Leicester, M. P. in the 8th

year of Edward II.

Thomas de St. Maur founded the priory at Dulton.

Sir Nicholas de St. Maur, Knt., was in the wars in France in the 21st and 33d years of Edward III and M. P. in the 25th to 34th years and died in the 35th year of the same reign. He married Muriel, daughter and heiress of James, son of Richard, Lord Lovell. Their son, Nicholas, died in his minority, and was succeeded by his brother Richard who married Ela, daughter of Sir John St. Lo, M. P. in the 4th year of Richard and 2d of Henry IV. Richard, Lord Lovell, was M. P. in the 3d to 8th year of Henry IV and died in the 10th year of his reign.

Alice de St. Maur married Sir William La Zouche.

Sir William de St. Maur settled in Monmouthshire.

Sir Roger de Sancto Maur, Lord of the Manor of Woundy, about 1269, died before 1300.

Roger de Sancto Maur married Joan, daughter of — Damarel, of Devonshire, and had two sons, John and Roger, both knights. Sir John died in 1358 and Sir Roger, younger brother, married Cecelia, daughter of John de Beauchamp, baron of Hache in Somersetshire. Their son William married Margaret, daughter of Simon de Brookburn in the county of Hereford, whose son Roger married Maud, daughter of Sir William Esturme, of Chadham, Wilts. Their son John was sheriff of Southampton in the 9th and 15th years of Henry VI and died in 1464. He married Isabel, daughter of William McWilliams, of Gloucestershire. Their son,

John Seymour, was sheriff of Wiltshire in the 36th year of Henry VI and died in 1463. He married a daughter of Sir Robert Coker, of Somerset, and left two sons, John and Humphrey. The latter married Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Winslow, of Barton, in Oxfordshire. The elder son, John, married as his first wife Elizabeth, daughter of Sir George Darell, of Littlecote in Wilts, and his wife Margaret, daughter of John, Lord Stourton; his second wife was a daughter of Robert Harden. By the first marriage there were four sons, Sir John, Sir George, Sir Robert, and Sir William, and four daughters, namely, Margaret, who married Sir William Wadham, Knt.; Jane, who married Sir

John Huddlestone, of County Cumberland; Elizabeth, who married John Crofts, Esq., and Catharine, who died unmarried. A son of the second wife was John

Seymour who left four daughters.

Sir John Seymour, the eldest of the four sons mentioned above, was knighted in the field for his signal service in battle against the Cornish rebels at Blackheath. He was sheriff of Wilts in the 23d year of Henry VII. In 1513 he had the honor of Knight Baronet conferred for gallantry at the siege of Tournay. He died December 21, 1536. By his wife Margaret, second daughter of Sir Henry Wentworth, of Suffolk, he had: Sir John Seymour, the eldest son, who died unmarried in the lifetime of his father; Edward, afterwards Duke of Somerset; Sir John (second child of this name) who married Barbara, daughter of Thomas Morgan, Esq., and had one son who died in 1578; Thomas Seymour, afterwards Baron Seymour, of Sudley, who married Catharine, relict of Henry VIII, and was afterwards executed for treason in 1548/9; John, fifth son, and Anthony, sixth son, both of whom died young; Jane Seymour, third wife of Henry VIII and mother of Edward VI; Elizabeth Seymour, who married first Sir Henry Oughton, second Gregory, Lord Cromwell, and third John Pawlet, 2d Marquis of Winchester; ninth, Margaret Seymour, who died as a child; and tenth, Dorothy Seymour, who married Sir Clement Smith, Kt., of Essex, father of Sir John Smith, Kt., ambassador to Spain.

Sir Edward Seymour was knighted at Roye for his service under the Duke of Suffolk in France. On the marriage of Henry VIII to his sister, Jane Seymour, the King created him Viscount Beauchamp, and at the baptism of his nephew, Edward VI, he obtained letters patent to be Earl of Hertford. In 1544 he had command of the army sent to Scotland to oblige Scots to consent to the marriage of the young Queen to his nephew, Edward VI, then Prince of Wales. In 1545 he was the King's lieutenant-general upon the borders and repulsed the Scots in every battle. From Scotland he was sent in command of the English army to France until peace was concluded. On January 9th of the 32d year of Henry VIII he was made one of the knights companion of the Order of the Garter and in the 34th year of the same reign he was made Lord Great Chamberlain of England for life. His titles were: The most noble and victorious prince, Edward, Duke of Somerset, Earl of Hertford, Viscount Beauchamp, Lord Seymour, governor of the person of the King's Majesty and Protector of all his realms, lieutenant-general of all his armies both by land and sea, lord high treasurer, Earl Marshal of England, governor of the isles of Guernsey and Jersey, and knight of the most noble Order of the Garter. The whole authority and prerogative of the Crown was vested in him during the minority of

Edward VI.

Sir Edward Seymour married first Catherine, daughter of Sir William Filliol, Knight, of Essex, by whom there were two sons, Sir John and Sir Edward. By his second marriage, to Anne Stanhope, daughter of Sir Edward Stanhope, of Suffolk, and his wife Elizabeth, there were three sons and three daughters.

On January 22, 1550, this great man was beheaded on Tower Hill on a

charge of felony, instigated by his enemies.

# DERIVATION OF THE SURNAME COSBY

The family name Cosby is of Saxon origin, being derived from the name given to the village or seat of Robert, of Cossibey, who was the progenitor of numerous lines of Cosbys in England and America. The line of descent follows:

- 1 ROBERT, of Cossibey.
- 2 JOHN,<sup>2</sup> of Cossibey.
- 3 ROBERT COSSIBEY,<sup>3</sup> of Hermaston, Lincolnshire, England, was living in 1516. He married Isabel, daughter and heiress of Ralph Page, Esq., of Great Leake, Nottinghamshire, and his wife Isabel, daughter and heiress of John Blake, of Hermaston. His son and heir,
- 4 JOHN COSBIE,<sup>4</sup> married Mabel, daughter of Argard, of Foston, Nottinghamshire. They had two sons, namely, Richard Cosbie, of Great Leake, whose only daughter, Bridget Cosbie, became the wife of William Towers, Gent., of Thunnock, and Francis Cosbie, mentioned next.
- 5 Francis Cosby (or Cosbie),<sup>5</sup> born in 1510 and died in Ireland in 1580, became the patriarch of the family in Ireland. He was a man famed for personal courage as well as civil and military talents. When young he served in the wars of King Henry VIII in the Low Countries and was not undistinguished. His abandonment of his native soil arose from the downfall of Sir Edward Seymour, Earl of Hertford and first Duke of Somerset, the Lord Protector of England, who had fallen into disfavor and was afterwards beheaded. His daughter, Mary Seymour, niece of Jane Seymour, third wife of King Henry VIII, married first Andrew Rogers and married secondly Henry Peyton, then married Francis Cosby. Three sons were born of the third marriage, namely, Henry Cosby,<sup>6</sup> who died in England, Alexander Cosby,<sup>6</sup> and Arnold Cosby.<sup>6</sup> (See No. 130, p. 292.)

After the disgrace and execution of the Duke of Somerset, in 1552, his immediate connections were excluded from and deprived of all hope of preferment. Francis Cosby<sup>5</sup> with his two surviving sons by Mary Seymour, and with his second wife, Elizabeth Palmer, here in the land of his adoption (Ireland) soon found the opportunity of establishing a reputation which he had despaired of effecting in the land of his birth (England). He became an active member of the Pale against the inroads of the Irish, his vigilance, zeal, and success attracting the attention of the Government. He was appointed by Queen Mary, under Her Majesty's sign manual, dated February 14, 1558, General of the Kern, a position of great trust and importance in those times.

In 1559 he represented the borough of Thomaston in Parliament, when he was constituted by Queen Elizabeth as Sheriff of the County of Kildare, being denominated in his patent, dated January 24, in the first year of Her Majesty's reign, "of Even" now "Minster Even", which place he held under an old grant from the Crown, and was invested at the same time with the extraordinary and unenviable privilege of exercising martial law

under his own authority solely, and of dealing out punishments, even the

most penal, as he should deem meet.

O'Hart, in his Irish Pedigrees, states that "after Leix had been formed into a county the following seven families were the chief English settlers during the reigns of Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth and were called the seven tribes, namely, Cosby, Harrington, Bowen, Rush, Harpole, Hitherington, and Hoveden."

General Francis Cosby fell in the battle of Glenmalure, at the head of the Kern which he valiantly led to the charge although then 70 years of

age (1580).

Francis Cosby's sons by his first wife, Mary Seymour, the daughter of the Duke of Somerset, were:

i Henry Cosby,6 who died in England.

ii Alexander Cosby,6 inheritor of the estates (mentioned below).

iii Arnold Cosby,6 who served under Robert, Earl of Leicester, with great reputation in the Low Countries (1586), with the celebrated Sir Philip Sydney. He received from Queen Elizabeth a pension of three shillings per day until he should be otherwise provided for in the army of the Kingdom.

By his second wife, Elizabeth Palmer, there was an only child,

- iv Catherine Cosby,6 who married Archibald Moore, Esq. There were no children of this marriage.
- 6 ALEXANDER COSBY, 6 Esq., of Stradbally Abbey, married Dorcas Sydney, daughter of William Sydney, Esq., of Oxford in Kent. She was second cousin to Sir Henry Sydney, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland and a cousin of Sir Philip Sydney. This lady had been one of the maids of honor to Queen Elizabeth and through her influential connections at Court obtained grants so extensive, at that period, that the family were the territorial lords of more than a moiety of Queens County. Dorcas Sydney bore Alexander Cosby fifteen children and after his death she married Sir Thomas Zouche.

Alexander Cosby appears to have been engaged most of his time in clan warfare with the O'Moores, the hereditary princes of Leix. Camden, in his Life of Queen Elizabeth, recites that he was once taken by Rory Oge O'Moore near Leighlin, and that he was rescued by Harpole when bound to a tree, but not before being badly wounded by Rory Oge's knife. The feud with the O'Moores endured in all its lawless violence until it came to an issue in 1596, when Anthony O'Moore, the chief of the clan bearing his name, demanded a passage over Stradbally bridge and made preparations to force it, but the demand, being deemed by Cosby to be a challenge, was promptly denied. The attempt being made by the O'Moores, on the 19th of May, 1596, the Lord of Stradbally, at the head of his Kern and accompanied by his eldest son and heir, Francis Cosby, engaged in combat on the bridge, the contest being witnessed from a window in the abbey by Dorcas Sydney and her daughter-in-law Ellen. Francis Cosby had married, about a year before, Ellen, daughter of Thomas Harpole, Esq., of Thurle, and had a son, William Cosby,8 but nine weeks old. In the conflict Alexander Cosby received a mortal wound which instantly turned the tide of battle. Francis Cosby, fearing that he would be entirely abandoned, went over the bridge in the hope of making good his retreat to the abbey, but the instant that he cleared the battlements he was mortally wounded and fell dead into the river.

These scenes, one would suppose, would have appalled the now widowed ladies who witnessed them, yet it is recorded that Ellen Harpole, with cool presence of mind, cautioned her mother-in-law to retain her recollection how the elder Cosby fell before his son, her husband, who had thus inherited the estates for a few minutes, entitling her to her thirds of dowry. It is not stated how the ladies escaped, but the infant, William Cosby, was carried off and preserved by his nurse. O'Moore, pursuing his victory, took possession of the abbey and, after sacking it of its valuables, consigned it to flames.

William Cosby<sup>8</sup> died young. Ellen (Harpole) Cosby, the widow, married secondly, in 1615, Sir Thomas Loftus, fourth son of Adam Loftus (mentioned later).

Among the fifteen children born to Alexander Cosby<sup>6</sup> and his wife, Dorcas Sydney, were:

- i Francis Cosby,7 born January 1, 1571 (mentioned page 297).
- ii Richard Cosby<sup>7</sup> (mentioned below).
- iii John Cosby,7 born in 1574 and died young.
- iv Charles Cosby, born September 12, 1585 (mentioned page 299).
- v John Cosby<sup>7</sup> (the second to bear the name), born in 1589 and died young.
- vi Arnold Cosby, born in 1591; settled in Cavan County, Ireland.

  Among the other children were two daughters, Mabel and Rose Cosby.

Richard Cosby<sup>7</sup> succeeded to the estates and became captain of the Kern and was eager to avenge the deaths of his father and brother. He challenged the O'Moores to a pitched battle and the contending clans met once more (1606) in the Glyn of Aggrabily under the Rock of Dunnamace, when a most bloody conflict ensued, terminating in the triumph of Cosby and the total defeat of his foes who were never afterwards able to defeat him. Capt. Richard Cosby received so many wounds in action that he could not be moved to Stradbally and was carried to Dysert House, then the seat of Sir Robert Pigot. His daughter, Elizabeth Pigot, nursed him with so much kindness and so much care that he asked her hand in marriage and she became his wife soon after his re-establishment at Stradbally.

Richard Cosby<sup>7</sup> and Elizabeth Pigot left children, some of whose descendants still are living in Ireland. To distinguish himself from the rest of the family he obtained a new grant of arms—viz.: Three leopards' heads with a chevron sable, retaining the canton with some alterations.

In order to repair the fortunes of the family occasioned by the loss of family records at the time of the burning of Stradbally Abbey, Richard Cosby<sup>7</sup> obtained, under commission of King James for the remedy of defective titles, a new title of the same import of the old one, which is still extant.

Governor William Cosby, of New York, and Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, was descended from Richard Cosby<sup>7</sup> and Elizabeth Pigot.

Dorcas Sydney evidently had a very high opinion of her own family, as in all grants of land made by her as well as in her private writings she used the name Sydney instead of Cosby, and she entertained a deep-rooted antipathy to the Pigots. Taking offense at the marriage of her son Richard to Elizabeth Pigot, she returned to England where she married her second husband, Sir Thomas Zouche, and left all her estates in Ireland, excepting Finshoe, to the Zouches, and leased Finshoe for a long term to Sir Thomas Loftus, son of Adam Loftus, who had become in 1615 the second husband of her daughter-in-law, Ellen Harpole Cosby, the widow of her son, Francis Cosby.<sup>7</sup> The family of Sir Thomas Zouche obtained extensive grants of land in Virginia, and Sir John Zouche had a patent in 1623 and was appointed by the Crown one of the commissioners to inquire into the condition of the colony, which he visited first in 1632.

7 CHARLES COSBY, fourth son of Alexander Cosby and Dorcas Sydney, born September 12, 1585, at Stradbally Abbey, Ireland, married Mary Loftus, daughter of Adam Loftus, D.D., of Trinity College, Cambridge, England, who was the second son of Edward Loftus, of Swineshead, County York, England, who settled in Ireland in the sixteenth century, where he obtained extensive grants of forfeited land from Queen Elizabeth and King James. Adam Loftus was chaplain to Queen Elizabeth and was made Archbishop of Armagh (Primate of Ireland) in 1563 and Lord Chancellor of Ireland in 1578. He was the first Provost of the University of Dublin. He married Jane Pruden and died in 1605. Their daughter, Anne Loftus, married Sir Henry Colley and was ancestress of the Duke of Wellington. Adam Loftus' fourth son, Sir Thomas Loftus, married Ellen (Harpole) Cosby, widow of Francis Cosby.7 The main line of Adam Loftus became extinct in 1783, but is represented in the female line by the Marquess of Ely and descendants. Charles Cosby's wife died November 23, 1623, leaving an only child, John Cosby,8 named after the two uncles who had died young.

Charles Cosby<sup>7</sup> was induced to settle in Virginia through his connection with the Zouches and he emigrated to York County, Va. (in that portion which afterwards became Warwick County) in 1628, with his infant son, John Cosby.<sup>8</sup>

Beginning with Robert,<sup>1</sup> of Cossibey, the founder of the Cosby family in England, and following the line to Charles Cosby,<sup>7</sup> the emigrant to Virginia, the record to page 314 is in large part a compilation of his descendants made by Frank Carvill Cosby and John S. Carpenter about 1910. The generations have attached to each name a small numeral. Each descendant of Charles Cosby<sup>7</sup> mentioned in this record can, by subtracting 6 from his generation number, to allow for the six generations previous to Charles,<sup>7</sup> and adding the remainder to the number of generations set out above, obtain their own generation number from each ancestor mentioned.

### Descendants of Fortunatus Cosby<sup>12</sup> and Mary Ann Fontaine

12f FORTUNATUS COSBY<sup>12</sup> (Charles, 11 David, 10 Charles, 9 John, 8 Charles 7), born in Louisa County, Va., December 20, 1767, and died October 10, 1846. He graduated at William and Mary College at the age of 19. He married November 1, 1795, Mary Ann Fontaine, born October 14, 1778, daughter of Captain Aaron Fontaine who was born November 30, 1753, and died in April, 1823, and was a soldier in the Revolution. Her mother was Barbara Terrell, daughter of Richmond and Ann (Overton) Terrell, of Louisa County, Va. The descendants of this union, through the Terrells of Virginia and the Tyrrell family of England, can trace their ancestry on the maternal side, as well as on the paternal side, to Edward I, King of England, and the royal houses of Europe as well as to Magna Charta Sureties, through the marriage of Anna Marney to Sir Thomas Tyrrell. (See No. 125 in Line of Descent from William the Conqueror to Edward I, King of England, page 417 of Addenda; see also No. 124 in Line of Descent from Pepin le Gros to Ralf, Sire de Tirel, page 400 of Addenda.)

Fortunatus Cosby<sup>12</sup> removed to Kentucky in 1796 with his father-inlaw, Capt. Aaron Fontaine, and settled on Harrod's Creek, and moved to Louisville in 1802. Two of their children were:

- i Elizabeth Sydnor Cosby, 13 born in 1799 and died January 17, 1841; married Hon. Charles Wynn Thurston, son of Col. John Thurston who served under Gen'l George Washington in the French and Indian Wars and subsequently became an Episcopal minister. At the outbreak of the Revolution he put aside his cassock and became a colonel of cavalry.
- ii Fortunatus Cosby,<sup>13</sup> born May 2, 1801, at the home of his grand-father, Captain Aaron Fontaine, on Harrod's Creek, Ky. He entered Yale University with the class of 1821 but was called home on account of illness, after which he took his degree at Transylvania University, Lexington, Ky. About 1823, with his cousin, Dabney Carr Terrell, a great-nephew of ex-President Thomas Jefferson, he visited at Monticello. In 1850 he went to Washington, having an appointment in the Treasury Department, and remained until 1861 when he was appointed by President Lincoln as United States consul at Geneva, Switzerland. He sailed for his post in September, 1861. When his nomination was submitted to the Senate for confirmation some doubt was expressed

as to his loyalty as he was from a Southern State and had a son-in-law in the Confederate Army. The Senate adjourned without acting on his nomination and his appointment lapsed. However, he was immediately reappointed and finally confirmed and commissioned on February 18, 1863. He only served until October 10, 1863, and afterwards remained abroad until after the close of the Civil War. He died in Louisville, Ky., June 15, 1871. He married in Louisville, May 8, 1825, Ellen Mary Jane Blake, second child of Martin and Mary (Loring) Blake, of Boston, Mass. She died April 27, 1848. Their children were:

- a Robert Todd Cosby,<sup>14</sup> born April 18, 1826, and died July 4, 1853. He was a distinguished poet.

This was the "crack regiment" of the Army, most of the officers having been selected by Jefferson Davis, then Secretary of War, on account of distinguished service. He resigned at the outbreak of the Civil War and joined the Confederate States Army and became a general. After the close of the Civil War he retired to Canada for some months but later went to California. He married at Fort Mason, Texas, Antonia Johnson, niece of Major General Richard T. Johnson, U. S. A., and daughter of Dr. John Milton Johnson, of Paducah, Ky., Medical Director, C. S. A. He died June 29, 1909, at Oakland, Cal. Their children were:

9f JOHN COSBY9 (John,8 Charles7), sixth child of John Cosby8 and his second wife, Sarah -, of York County, Va., was born probably in 1680 and died in 1761. His will was probated in Louisa County, Va., May 26, 1761. He was executor of his mother's will in 1749. He became an extensive land owner. On September 8, in 1730, four grants, each of 400 acres, were made to John Cosby and Charles Barret, of Hanover County (Virginia Land Grant Records, Vol. 3, pp. 501, 510). These grants were purchased by a payment of 40 shillings for each 400 acres. On September 28 400 acres adjoining were purchased by them for the importation of four persons. On August, 1731, John Cosby bought 400 acres on Tan Flat fork of Little River in Louisa County. The grant, June 10, 1740, of 3,000 acres, confirmed and included former grants. The greater part of his land was in that portion of Hanover Co. which in 1742 was cut off from Hanover and became Louisa County. He was a man of considerable wealth. He married first, in 1710, Martha Garland, daughter of Edward Garland, son of Peter Garland, the emigrant from Wales in 1650, who was of the Sussex, England, branch of the Garland family. Martha Garland was born in 1690 and died in 1749. She was a sister of Margaret Garland who married William Overton and also of Elizabeth Garland who married Capt. James Overton.

John Cosby<sup>9</sup> married secondly, in 1750, Mrs. Anne (Meriwether) Johnson, born in 1694 and died in 1785, widow of Thomas Johnson and daughter of Nicholas Meriwether (born October 26, 1647) and his wife, Elizabeth Crawford, daughter of David Crawford, of New Kent County, Va.
